#### 1. Introductions

The 2020 Joint Berrien County and the Cities of Alapaha, Enigma, Nashville, and Ray City Comprehensive Plan were prepared per the Rules of the Georgia Department of Community Affairs Chapter 110-12-1, Minimum Standards, and Procedures for Local Comprehensive Planning, effective March 1, 2025.

# 2. History

#### Berrien County

Berrien County, located in the south-central portion of Georgia, was created on February 25, 1856. It is Georgia's 116<sup>th</sup> county, created by an act of the Georgia General Assembly from parts of Coffee, Irwin, and Lowndes Counties. The county is named after the former U.S. Senator, U.S. Attorney General, and Georgia politician John Macpherson Berrien (1781-1856). The county contains four municipalities: Alapaha, Enigma, Nashville, and Ray City. Berrien County borders Atkinson, Coffee, Cook, Irwin Lanier, Lowndes, and Tift Counties.

#### City of Alapaha

Alapaha developed from a trade settlement on the site of Seminole Village and depot and operated in the town on the route of the Brunswick and Albany Railroad around 1874. The 1880s and 1890s brought an agricultural and industrial boom in forestry, timber, and naval stores. Alapaha, incorporated in 1881. In 1897, a catastrophic fire destroyed many uninsured businesses in downtown Alapaha.

Alapaha was also known for the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad train wreck on March 26, 1911. The Dixie Flyer derailed on a high trestle across the Alapaha River, killing ten and injuring many wealthy Northern socialites who were traveling to the coast. Eight weeks before the Armistice ended World War 1, Alapaha lost four of the total of 25 men in the infamous *Otranto* troopship disaster, off the coast of Scotland.

#### City of Enigma

Enigma is a small town in southern Georgia, located in the northwest corner of Berrien County. Enigma was founded between 1876 and 1880, by John A. Ball and incorporated on August 21, 1906. It was originally a settlement, commonly referred to as "Gunn and Weston" until Ball decided he wanted a real name for the town. By definition, Enigma means a puzzle or mystery, and Ball said, "It was a puzzle what to name it anyway."

#### City of Nashville

Nashville, the county seat of Berrien County was incorporated as a town on December 20, 1892, and as a city in 1900. The town was originally founded in 1840 and named in like fashion to its Tennessee counterpart, Nashville, for the Revolutionary War hero General Francis Nash (1742-1777), fatally wounded in the Battle of Germantown. Nashville is the largest city within Berrien County with a total area of 4.7 square miles.

#### City of Ray City

Ray City was formally named Ray's Mill and was located one mile east of the present town on Ray's Mill Pond and was named for Thomas M. Ray retaining Ray's Mill name for several years. The mill was operated by water from the pond to grind meal and hominy grits from the corn while being operated by Mr. Thomas Ray until his death. In 1909, Perry T. Knight, State Representative from Berrien County, introduced a bill to change the town's name to Ray City. On August 16, 1909, Ray City became incorporated.

During the years of heavy rail traffic in Berrien County, the cutting of crossties was a very lucrative business. As the Great Depression had a devastating impact on Ray City, it suffered losses of many of its people and businesses. When Moody Air Force Base opened, it provided many needed jobs and helped to restore the City's economic base. Many military families have chosen Ray City as their home following retirement.

# 3. Community Involvement

The required elements have been developed with extensive opportunities for involvement and input from stakeholders throughout the county and cities. The following steps were taken to ensure this plan reflects the full range of needs and opportunities of the many stakeholders and residents in the county:

- a) Stakeholders were identified. These included Mayors, City Council persons, County Administrators/Managers, Code Enforcement Officers, Chamber of Commerce directors, Utilities Departments, Main Street Directors, and City Clerks.
- b) Participation techniques were identified. Techniques used included a kick-off public information meeting, printed public information in local newspapers, and information on the Southern Georgia Regional Commission's website and local government websites.
- c) A participation program was conducted. Identified stakeholders were invited and attended; yielding specific input in plan content.
- d) Community Involvement Activities documented. A list of stakeholders and an overview of participation...(photos, sign-in sheets, agendas, minutes, published advertisements, emails, and the SGRC website) are included.

# 1st Public Hearing - "Kick Off"

The public hearing kick-off for the comprehensive planning process was held on March 26, 2024, at the Berrien County Commissioners Chambers at 201 North Davis St, Room 198, Nashville, Georgia. It was held to make any potential stakeholders and residents

aware of the comprehensive plan update and that a review was now underway; to explain the purpose of the update, and to encourage residents and other stakeholders to actively participate in the plan update.

#### 2nd Public Hearing - Transmittal of Document

The 2nd public hearing was held on January 7, 2023, at the Berrien County Commissioners Chamber at 201 North Davis St., Room 198, Nashville, Georgia. The purpose of this meeting was to receive approval to submit the document for review by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs.

# 6. Conduct Participation Program

A foundational principle utilized by the Southern Georgia Regional Commission in all of its planning projects is public and stakeholder participation from, and coordination with, multiple and diverse interest groups. Outreach to the public, local governments, and other stakeholders and interested parties was accomplished by e-mail correspondence, direct communication, the project website, and updates provided at workshops and other group meetings. Opportunity for public comment was presented at public hearings and city and county commission meetings. The Steering Committee reviewed the plan ensuring the broadest buy-in and diversity of input into the comprehensive plan update.

In addition to the two required public hearings, SGRC held a series of three workshops to discuss several elements of the plan. The first workshop was used to review the existing goals, issues, and opportunities; in the form of a SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis, participants updated the list of goals, issues, and opportunities to meet current needs. Copies of the sign-in sheets are provided in the appendix along with public hearing notices.

The policies were reviewed to reflect the revised issues and opportunities. The Report of Accomplishments and Community Work Program was discussed and developed in individual meetings with each community. Emphasis was put on achievable, realistic projects for the next five years. A section for long-term projects the communities plan to undertake has been added to the Community Work Program.

The third workshop was utilized to update the Economic Development Element and the Land Use Element and Maps as desired by the local governments.

In addition to the two required public hearings, SGRC held a series of three workshops to discuss several elements of the plan.

# 1<sup>st</sup> Workshop (SWOT ANALYSIS)

The first workshop, held on September 5, 2023, was used to review the existing goals, needs, and opportunities; in the form of a SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis, participants updated the list of goals, issues, and opportunities to meet current needs. 
# 2nd Workshop (SWOT ANALYSIS)

# 7. Consideration of Regional Water Plan and Environmental Planning Criteria

During the preparation of the Comprehensive Plan, the local governments must review both the Regional Water Plan covering its area and the GDNR Rules for Environmental Planning Criteria, as laid out in Chapter 391-3-16, to determine whether any local implementation practices or development regulations need to be adapted to be consistent with both.

#### Suwannee-Satilla Regional Water Plan

Berrien County is within the area of the Suwannee-Satilla Regional Water Plan, which was adopted in June 2023. The Suwannee-Satilla Council is one of 11 planning regions charged with developing Regional Water Plans and encompasses 18 counties in the southeastern portion of Georgia (shown in Figure ES-1). An overview of the updated findings and recommendations for the Suwannee- Satilla Region are provided in this Executive Summary. The Suwannee- Satilla Council's Regional Water Plan is available on the Council's website.

The Suwannee-Satilla Council has identified 13 goals for the region. It is important to note that the goals are summarized below, not presented in order of priority, but instead were assigned a number to identify specific goals addressed as part of the water management practice selection process.

"The Vision of the Suwannee- Satilla Regional Council is to manage water resources in a sustainable manner under Georgia's regulated riparian and regulated reasonable use laws to support the state's and region's economy, to protect public health and natural resources, and to enhance the quality of life for all citizens; while preserving the private property rights of Georgia's landowners, and in consideration of the need to enhance resource augmentation and efficiency opportunities."

#### Suwannee-Satilla Regional Water Plan Goals:

- 1. Manage and develop water resources to sustainably and reliably meet domestic, commercial, industrial water needs, and agricultural water needs, including all agricultural sectors (this includes the agroforestry economy of the region).
- 2. Manage groundwater and surface water to encourage sustainable economic and population growth in the region.
- 3. Manage the region's and state's water resources in a manner that preserves and protects private property rights.
- 4. Ensure an adequate water supply of suitable quality to meet current and future human needs, while protecting environmental resources.
- 5. Identify opportunities to optimize existing and future supplies, and water and wastewater infrastructure.
- 6. Promote efficient use and management of surface and groundwater resources to allow for sufficient supplies for current and future generations.
- 7. Protect and manage surface and groundwater recharge areas to ensure sufficient long-term water supplies for the region.
- 8. Protect, maintain, and where appropriate and practicable, identify opportunities to enhance water quality, and river base flows.

- 9. Protect and maintain regional water-dependent recreational opportunities.
- 10. Identify opportunities to manage stormwater to improve water quantity and quality.
- 11. Identify and implement cost-effective water management strategies.
- 12. Seek to provide economically affordable power and water resource service to all citizens of the region.
- 13. Identify and implement actions to better measure and share water use data and information.

#### Addressing Water Needs and Regional Goals

This Section presents the Suwannee-Satilla Council's water management practices selected to address resource shortfalls or challenges identified and described in Section 5, and/or meet the Council's Vision and Goals described in Section 1.

#### Identifying Water Management Practices

The comparison of Resource Assessments and forecasted needs presented in Section 5 identifies the Region's likely resource shortfalls or challenges and demonstrates the need for region and resource specific water management practices. In the cases where shortfalls or challenges appear to be unlikely based on the comparison of the Region's Resource Assessments and forecasted needs, the management practices described in this section have been selected to also meet those needs specified by the

Council (e.g., facility/infrastructure needs and practices, programmatic practices, etc.) that are aligned with the Region's Vision and Goals. In selecting the actions needed (i.e., water management practices), the Council considered practices identified in existing plans, the Region's Vision and Goals, and coordinated with local governments and water providers as well as neighboring Councils who share these water resources.

#### Review of Existing Plans and Practices

The Council conducted a comprehensive review of existing local and regional water management plans and relevant related documents to frame the selection of management practices. The types of plans/studies that were reviewed to support identification and selection of management practices for the Suwannee-Satilla Region consisted of the following:

• Comprehensive Work Plans (local and regional scale)

- Regional infrastructure and permitting plans
- EPD databases (permitted withdrawals, planned projects, and proposed reservoirs)
- State-wide guidance documents (conservation, cost, and water planning)
- Best Management Practices (forestry, agriculture, and stormwater management)
- Water quality studies including Watershed Protection Plans (basin, watershed, and local scale)
- TMDL evaluations

When possible, successful management practices already planned for and/or in use in the Suwannee-Satilla Region formed the basis for the water management practices selected by the Council.



# **II. Plan Elements**

# **Community Goals**

#### **Vision Statement**

Berrien County and the Cities of Alapaha, Enigma, Nashville, and Ray City envision working together to provide all citizens and visitors of Berrien County with a high quality of life. The high quality of life shall include a strong economy, safe communities, educational opportunities, a clean environment, and excellent public services for all.

- **Goal 1:** Natural and Cultural Resources. Encourage the protection and conservation of the vibrant historical heritage in Berrien County, including the Cities of Alapaha, Enigma, Nashville, and Ray City.
- **Goal 2: Economic Development.** Create and maintain a long-term sustainable and diverse economic base.
- **Goal 3: Housing.** Ensure that residents within Berrien County have access to quality and affordable housing.
- Goal 4: Land Use. Establish and maintain conservation and protection of natural areas, where those areas would be endangered by development. These areas include, but are not limited to, floodplains, wetlands, groundwater recharge areas, protected river corridors, and forested hardwood areas, and areas where Georgia and Federally Endangered species and habitat exist.
- Goal 5: Transportation. To promote transportation facilities, which protect our community resources, promote efficient use of infrastructure, and support quality economic development.
- Goal 6: Community Facilities & Services. Develop and maintain public services and facilities to accommodate existing development and to encourage future sustainable growth in areas where community facilities and services are provided at adequate capacities.
- Goal 7: Intergovernmental Coordination. Enhance and maintain communication between each jurisdiction and surrounding counties to efficiently and effectively serve the residents of Berrien County.
- **Goal 8: Broadband Services.** Ensure broadband services are accessible throughout the communities and are consistent, reliable, and equitable.

# II. Needs and Opportunities

The Needs and Opportunities, as shown in this Section, were developed through discussions with stakeholders and residents, and analysis of statistical data and information. The stakeholders reviewed and revised as applicable, the issues and opportunities identified in the 2025 Partial Update for Berrien County and the Cities of Alapaha, Enigma, Nashville, and Ray City. Each of the following needs and opportunities are addressed in the Community Work Program.

#### NATURAL RESOURCES AND CULTURAL RESOURCES

#### **Needs**

- Expand Cultural Resources: Increase the availability of cultural and historical resources across the county and cities to enhance community engagement.
- Grant Research and Application: Identify and apply for grants that align with local funding needs to support community initiatives.
- Increase Hotel Capacity: Encourage the development of more hotel accommodations throughout the county and cities to support tourism and local events.
- Promote Local Museums: Improve marketing efforts for the Courthouse Museum and other small museums in Alapaha to boost visibility and attract more visitors.

#### **Opportunities**

- Promote Public Fishing Areas: Highlight the Paradise Public Fishing Area and other local fishing spots, including the Alapaha River, to attract fishing enthusiasts and outdoor tourism.
- Enhance Historic Tourism: Encourage economic development and tourism by promoting the county's historic buildings, including the County Courthouse and other significant sites throughout the area.
- Develop Cultural Resources: Create additional cultural attractions and programs to entice tourists and strengthen the county's appeal as a cultural destination.
- Explore Native American Heritage: Research the county's Native American history and explore opportunities to develop tourism attractions that celebrate and educate visitors on this heritage.

#### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

#### **Needs**

- Lack of enough work force to entice new industry
- Need to increase affordable housing throughout the cities and county
- Too many commercial buildings are vacant
- Need for E-vehicle Charging stations

#### **Opportunities**

- There is room for future economic growth throughout the county
- Lower taxes compared to surrounding counties
- Berrien County schools are above average and is rated higher that surrounding public school systems.
- Explorer the possibilities of expansion of current industries throughout the county
- Explore the feasibility of creating a business park
- Encourage economic develop by considering the possibility expanding the Berrien County Recreation Department to bring in athletic tournaments
- Proximity to state highways 82 and 129

#### Needs

- Need for more affordable housing
- Need to redevelop older housing stock
- Available land for purchase to develop for housing

#### **Opportunities**

- Berrien county has land and room to increase the housing stock
- Revitalize and bring up to code older homes, in Nashville, Ray City, Enigma, Alapaha, and in the county.
- Lower cost of living/housing than surrounding counties
- Utilize Community Development Block Grant to rehab existing housing and aid in the construction of new housing.
- Identify land throughout the county and cities to be developed for future housing.

#### LAND USE

#### Needs

Land use codes need to be update for the county

- Enigma needs to adopt a zoning ordinance.

# **III. Analysis of Data and Information**

#### **Population Percentage Change**

The 2023 population of Berrien County is 18,925. This is a slight decline in population since the last Comprehensive Plan. The county's population remains steady since 2010 Census with only a small decrease in residents. Since the 2010 census the estimated decrease is -2.25%. Alapaha increased by 1.24%, Engima increased by 2.26%, Nashville decreased by -1.74%, and Ray City increased by 1.65%.

#### Population by Race

In Berrien County, 85.0% percent of the population is White, and 11.3% percent are Black; Asian make up 1.1%, tow or more races is 1.9% percent of the population. 6.0 percent are of Hispanic/Latino origin. In Alapaha, 34.93% are white, and 53.85% are black, 8.94 are Other/multi-racial. Enigma, 75% are white, 6.00% are black, 4% Other/multi-racial, and 16% are of Hispanic/Latino origin. In Nashville, 70.14% are white, 21.16% are black, and 3.96% are Hispanic or Latino. In Ray City, 64.94% of the population is white, 21.44% are black, and 8.47% are Hispanic or Latino and 4.08% are Other/multi-racial.

#### **Median Age**

The median age in Berrien County is 39.8, compared with a median US age of 38.8. The median age in Alapaha is 46.2, Enigma 41.7 Nashville 36.4, and Ray City 24.8.

#### Population by Age

Population by age in Berrien County is 6.3% under the age of 5 years, 25.4% are 5-24 years of age, 50.7% are 25-64 years of age, and 17.7% are 65 years of age and over. Alapaha is 3.7% under the age of 5, 11.8% are 5-24 years of age, 57.2% are 25-64 years of age, and 27.3% are 65 years of age or over. Engima is 7.5% under age 5, 28.5% are 5-24 years of age, 49.1% 25-64 years of age, and 14.8% over the age of 65. Nashville is 8.8% under five years of age, 22% 5-24 years of age, 50.5% 25-64 years of age, and 18.7% over the age of 65. Ray City is 9.1% under age 5, 41.6% 5-24 years of age, 41.9% 25-64 years of age, and 65 and over is 7.3%.

#### Households & Families

There are 8,141 households and 6,773 families living within the county, with an average of 2.66 people per household. Alapaha has 272 housing units with and average of 2.2 people per household. 272 families, Enigma has 462 with 368 families, and average of

2.7 people per household. Nashville has 1,808 with 1,119 families and average of 2.6 people per household. and Ray City has 355 housing units with 230 families and average of 3.2 people per household.

#### **Home Values**


In Berrien County, 47.3% of homes are valued at less than \$100,000, about 27.1% are valued between \$100,000 and \$200,000, and only about 25.6% percent of the housing stock is valued at more than \$200,000. 69.1% percent of housing units are owneroccupied, 30.9% percent are rentals, and 12.2% percent of the housing stock in Berrien County are vacant. In Alapaha, 47.54% of homes are valued at less than \$100,000, 26.5% are valued between \$100,000 and \$200,000, and only 26% are valued at more than \$200,000. 66.5% housing units are owner occupied, 33.5% are rentals, and 14.6% are vacant. In Enigma 69.1% of homes are valued at less than \$100,000, 16.7% are valued between \$100,000 and \$200,000, and 10.7% is valued at more than \$200,000. 50.4% is owner occupied, 47.1% is rentals, and 14.60% are vacant. 60.4% of homes are valued at less than \$100,000, 29.7% is valued between \$100,000 and \$200,000, and 10.0% is valued at more than \$200,000. 52.9% of homes are owner occupied, 47.1% are rentals, and 12.04% are vacant. In Ray City, 19.0% of housing units are valued at less than \$100,000, 81.0% are valued between \$100,000 and \$200,000 and 0.0% are valued at more than \$200,000. 58.8% are owner occupied, 50.0% are rentals, and 0.08% are vacant in Ray City.




The median home value in Berrien County has increase similarily to the entire reagon. The meidan property is \$108,300, Alapaha is \$105,400, Enigma is \$93,200, Nashville is \$87,600, and Ray City is \$116,400.


#### **Median Household Income**


All of Berrien County saw an increase in the median household income since 2020. The median household income in Berrien County is \$48,670, an increase of 27.08% since 2015. The median household income in Alapaha is \$40,294, a rise of 4.26% since 2015. The median household income in Enigma is \$38,750, an increase of 44.60% since 2015. The median income in Nashville is \$45,500, with a rise of 43.32% since 2015. Ray City has a median income of \$46,875, an increase of 75.40% since 2015.














# IV. Broadband


In recognition of the importance of broadband infrastructure to the vitality of communities, the Georgia legislature passed the Achieving Connectivity Everywhere (ACE) Act (SB 402) in 2018. The Act provides planning, deployment, incentives, and other purposes for broadband services. It also requires comprehensive plans to promote the deployment of broadband services. Berrien County, the Cities of Alapaha, Engima, Nashville and Ray City recognize the importance of broadband expansion by including this Element in their Comprehensive Plan.

Broadband services enable residents to access vital services such as healthcare, economic opportunity, and education. Expansion of rural broadband and improvement in the position of broadband services can address concerns of resident out-migration. Effective and efficient broadband enables internet-based businesses to succeed in the global economy. Educating upcoming generations of students in web literacy and digital skills training with adequate broadband speed and connectivity is challenging.



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





Berrien County Broadband Map





#### **Community Policies** VI.

The following policies, numbered to align with the Community Goals, were developed in conjunction with all stakeholders and are intended to provide qualitative guidance to address the Issues and Opportunities identified in this Plan and to provide a framework for the development of the Community Work Program. The Community Work Program then addresses the Issues and Opportunities through specific projects, for each of which the participants, anticipated cost, and time frame are identified.

These policies are organized around the issues identified in the "Needs and Opportunities" section, and are further organized around the seven important topics of the Plan:

- 1. Natural and Cultural Resources
- 2. Economic Development
- 3. Housing
- 4. Land Use
- 5. Transportation6. Community Facilities and Services
- 7. Intergovernmental Coordination
- 8. Broadband Services

### **Natural Resources**

Goal 1: Execute and support conservation and protection measures for natural areas. These areas include, but are not limited to, floodplains, wetlands, groundwater recharge zones, protected river corridors, hardwood forests, and habitats supporting Georgia and federally listed endangered species.

Needs & Policies

Need: The community needs to protect the valuable water resources in order to maintain clean drinking water and use of waterways for recreation.

- Water Resources. Coordinate with the surrounding counties and cities to Policy 1.1: ensure that the water resources of the area are protected.
- **Inventory of Resources.** Berrien County should create a detailed inventory of its natural resources to support their effective protection and long-term preservation.

Need: Berrien County needs to protect water resources and promote public fishing areas for recreations and outdoor tourism

Policy 1.3: **Promotion of Resources.** develop promotional materials and programs for local outdoor activities, including public fishing opportunities throughout the County and particularly at the Paradise Public Fishing Area.

Need: Better public access and boat ramps are required for boaters and swimmers to utilize the Alapaha River. (State River Water Designation).

Policy 1.4: **Public Access.** Increase public access points along the Alapaha River by partnering with local and state agencies for available funding opportunities.

### **Cultural Resources**

<u>Goal 2</u>: Encourage economic development and tourism by promoting the historic buildings throughout the county including the County Courthouse and smaller museums in Alapaha and Ray City

**Needs & Policies** 

Need: Historic places are insufficiently utilized to create economic development opportunities.

Policy 2.1: **Guidelines.** Produce promotional material and guideline pamphlet for public distribution and education about Berrien County Historic location

### **Economic Development**

Goal 3: Increase and diversify economic base by creating a desirable community for industry to locate to Berrien County.

### **Needs & Policies**

Policy 3.1: **Development.** Establish relationship with owners of vacant commercial buildings to redevelop in downtown areas in Berrien County

- Policy 3.2: **Education.** Coordinate with the Berrien County School and Wiregrass Technical College to ensure that graduates will create an incentive for prospective industries
- Policy 3.3: **Marketing.** Promote to prospective industries low taxes, good school system and room to grow in Berrien County.

Need: A dedicated Business Park to attach new industry.

Policy 3.4: **Research.** Explore the land options possibility of creating a Business Park

Need: Berrien County and Cities need to promote the area by offering services necessary to attract MAFB (Moody) population.

- Policy 3.5: **Promote & Support.** Promote and support existing and expanding local businesses and industries.
- Policy 3.6: **Sustainable & Innovative**. Promote and encourage sustainable and innovative agri-business opportunities.

Need: A Gateway Plan needs to be put in place for entering the county promoting tourism opportunities.

Policy 3.7: **Gateway Plan.** Berrien County and all its cities needs to seek out ways to enhance the entrance into the county and the city limits of: Alapaha, Enigma, Nashville and Ray City. This can be done by adopting a Gateway Plan to be established from MAFB to Berrien County.

### Housing

Goal 4: Ensure that all residents within Berrien County and cities have access to quality and affordable housing.

### **Needs & Policies**

Need: The entire county and its cities needs to increase its stock of workforce housing.

- Policy 4.1: **Funding Opportunities:** Research the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding and Georgia Initiative Community Housing (GICH) opportunities that can help develop suitable low-income housing.
- Policy 4.2: **Housing Inventory.** Identify locations to build workforce housing.

Policy 4.3: **Funding Opportunities.** Research the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding and Georgia Initiative Community Housing (GICH) opportunities to rehab existing housing.

Need: Many blighted structures should be rehabbed, cleaned up, and replaced with affordable housing.

Policy 4.4: **Infill Housing.** Update ordinances in order to better maintain housing stock

### Land Use

<u>Goal 5:</u> Preserve and strengthen the value of existing developed areas; encourage sustainable development and revitalization within urbanized zones; foster the growth of stable, vibrant neighborhoods; and ensure the availability of accessible open spaces to support future land use opportunities.

#### **Needs & Policies**

Need: Land use compatibility issues with Moody AFB exist due to encroachment of residential subdivisions into or near the flight path, in addition to impacts from the base to the County's natural and cultural resources.

- Policy 5.1: **Natural and Cultural Resources.** Continue to identify all-natural and cultural resources that are located within the flight paths and noise contours of Moody Air Force Base.
- Policy 5.2: **Flight Impacts.** Coordinate with Moody Air Force Base via the JLUS study to ensure that any flight impacts to cultural and natural resources within Berrien County are mitigated.
- Policy 5.3: **Noise Standards.** Continue to enforce the noise attenuating building standards for new residential homes within the flight paths and noise contours of Moody Air Force Base.
- Policy 5.4: **Land Use Measures.** The City of Nashville should continue to implement the JLUS Plan that will protect natural resources and natural stormwater management areas like floodplains, marshes, and steep slopes.
- Policy 5.5: **Joint Land Use Study (JLUS).** Continue to participate in the implementation of the JLUS with Lowndes County and Moody Air Force Base.

Need: Enigma does not have a zoning ordinance.

Policy 5.6: **Zoning Ordinance.** If not consolidating ordinances with the county, the City of Enigma needs to adopt a zoning ordinance.

Need: Alapaha needs to past a zoning ordinance.

Policy 5.7: **Zoning Ordinance.** The town of Alapaha has to finalize and pass its zoning ordinance.

Need: Development of appropriate land development regulations for the County and the Cities.

Policy 5.8: **Consolidation of Ordinances.** Consolidation of county and city ordinances and regulations would allow better enforcement within the communities.

### **Transportation**

<u>GOAL 6:</u> To ensure that the County's has adequate road system for all users that live and travel through Berrien County including sidewalks, pedestrian safety devices, bicycles, and mobility air devices.

#### **Needs and Policies:**

Need: The county has dirt roads that need to paved and each city has streets that need to be repaved.

Policy 6.1: **Road Work Funding.** Create a plan to use SPLOST, LMIG, TSPLOST and CDBG funds to pave or repave roads throughout Berrien County and its four cities.

Need: Sidewalks are need in residential areas that lead to downtown areas, recreational area, and medical facilities.

Policy 6.2: **Pedestrian and Cyclist Capacity.** Support the continued development of pedestrian and cyclist capacity throughout the County and Cities, particularly in areas with institutional and residential uses.

Need: The cities of Alapaha, Enigma, and Ray City are in need of gateway signs at their entrances to enhance visibility, create a welcoming atmosphere, and promote a strong sense of community identity.

Policy 6.3: **Positive Impacts.** Placing gateway sign at entry points of these cities creates a warm and inviting atmosphere for newcomers and tourists. Signs encourage economic activity by drawing attention to local businesses and attractions. Signs can highlight key features, landmarks, or slogans that promote tourism.

Need: Create a plan for future expansion of Berrien County Airport.

Policy 6.4: **Airport Expansion.** Collaborate with Development Authority to create a plan and research a funding source to expand the Berrien County Airport.

Need: Continue public transportation partnership with the Southern Georgia Regional Commission.

Policy 6.5: **Public Transit**. Federal programs and regional resources can help to fund public transit.

### **Community Facilities and Services**

Goal 7: Maintain community facilities in order to better service residents to use for events and recreation also to host visitors to enhance the county's economic development.

### **Needs & Policies**

Need: The County needs a large multi-purpose facility

- Policy 7.1: **Multi-purpose Plan.** Develop and research a location and a funding source to build a multi-purpose facility in Berrien County.
- Policy 7.2: **Create a plan for Indoor Multi-purpose Sports Facility.** Research a funding source to cover the Saddle Club Arena

Need: Recreation Department hosting regional, district, and state tournaments

- Policy 7.3: **Recreation.** Create a plan to upgrade the Berrien County Recreation Department with the goal of hosting outside tournaments.
- Policy 7.4: **Saddle Club Arena Plan.** Research a funding source to cover the Saddle Club Arena

Need: An EMS station is needed for the South end of the county

Policy 7.5: **Funding Sources.** Research a location and funding source to put an EMA Station in southern portion of the Berrien County.

### Need: Continue to support the SGMC Berrien Campus

Policy 7.5: **Hospital.** Work with the hospital to ensure it can successfully service the citizens of Berrien County

### **Intergovernmental Coordination**

Goal 8: Enhance and maintain communication between each jurisdiction and surrounding counties to better serve the residents of Berrien County.

#### **Needs & Policies**

Need: The community needs more focused projects to support the success of the county and its cities. Clear goals and collaboration will help address challenges and create positive results.

- Policy 8.1: **Shared Goals.** The county should collaborate with the cities of Berrien County ensuring that their goals match.
- Policy 8.2: **Continue to improve services.** The county should collaborate with the cities of Berrien County ensuring that Service Delivery Strategy ties with the county's and cities current goals.

### **Broadband Services**

**Goal 9:** To encourage the expansion of existing broadband services and to allow more providers within the communities.

#### **Needs and Policies:**

Need: Broadband access. More affordable, accessible, and higher-speed broadband access is necessary throughout all of Berrien County and the Cities of Alapaha, Enigma, Nashville, and Ray City, especially in underserved areas.

Policy 9.1: **Public/Private Partnership.** Pursue development of public/private partnerships to provide comprehensive broadband coverage that is consistent, reliable, and equitable.

Policy 9.2: **Infrastructure in Right-of-Way.** Include consideration of broadband infrastructure in roadway projects where such infrastructure may be included in the right-of-way.

Policy 9.3: **Technology Infrastructure.** Community-wide technology

Infrastructure should be considered a primary community facility and as such, should be adequately planned for and implemented.

Policy 9.4: **Agriculture Services.** Investigate opportunities to improve broadband to meet agricultural needs.

## VIII. Economic Development Element

The 2022-2026 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS), developed by the Southern Georgia Regional Commission (SGRC) under a grant from the US Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration, is hereby incorporated by reference into this Comprehensive Plan to serve as the Economic Development Element for Berrien County and the Cities of Alapaha, Enigma, Nashville, and Ray City.

The SGRC's CEDS was designed to bring together the public and private sectors in the creation of an economic roadmap to diversify and strengthen the regional economy. The CEDS contains an analysis of the regional economy and serves as a guide for establishing regional goals and objectives, a regional plan of action, investment priorities, and funding sources.

As a performance-based plan, the CEDS plays a critical role in adapting to global economic conditions by fully utilizing the region's unique advantages to maximize economic opportunities for its residents by attracting job-creating private investment. The CEDS is a regionally owned strategy that is the result of a continuing economic development planning process developed with regional public- and private-sector participation. The CEDS sets forth the goals and objectives necessary to solve the economic development problems of the Southern Georgia region and clearly defines the measures of success.

The Southern Georgia CEDS gives an overview of the region, briefly describing the geography, population, economy, labor and workforce development and use, education, transportation access, environment, and regional resources. It reviews the state of the regional economy and provides a list of achievable goals and objectives for the region, a plan of action to ensure success, and performance measures used to evaluate the strategy's successful development and implementation.

Policies, needs, opportunities, and projects drawn from the current comprehensive plans for each jurisdiction in the 18-county SGRC region were used extensively to develop the EDA Investment Priorities, CEDS Strategic Focus Areas, Goals and respective Action Plans. Furthermore, the CEDS was also used to provide guidance for developing the goals, opportunities, policies, and projects in this local Comprehensive Plan.

Goals, needs and opportunities, policies, and community work program projects related to economic development can be found in the "Economic Development" subsections of the relevant sections of this Comprehensive Plan (goals in Section 1, needs and opportunities in Section 2, policies in Section 6, and work program projects in Section 7).

Furthermore, included below are strategic focus areas, goals, and action plans from the regional CEDS that are strongly aligned with the current economic development goals of Berrien County and the Cities of Alapaha, Enigma, Nashville, and Ray City.

#### IX. Land Use Element

#### **Character Areas**

In keeping with State Minimum Planning Standards, every part of the Greater Berrien Community was delineated into specific Character Areas. Character areas are intended to serve as guidance for future land use and land development. Each of the following character area narratives were developed based on stakeholder input, existing land uses, anticipated development, planned infrastructure improvements and expansions, and guidance found in the *State Planning Recommendations*. As with the Plan in general, these character area descriptions and goals should not be considered final. As the community gains a greater understanding of the role and value of character areas, their descriptions should be fine-tuned. Additionally, as the community continues to grow, specific character area depictions may need adjusting.

Each Character Area narrative has a unique **Description** stating either the existing or desired qualities for that area. (Please note the associated picture for each area represents the current state of the specific area and should not be construed to necessarily represent the desired state, although, for some descriptions, this may be the case.) **Predominant Land Uses** are then described.

The stated **Development Strategy** should serve as a guide for all development and redevelopment taking place in the Character Area. Adherence to these development strategies is intended to ensure consistent and complementary development, which promotes a greater sense of place and overall improved quality of life.

The listing of **Permitted Zoning Districts** provides guidance as to the land development districts that are encouraged within each Character Area. While many of the differences between uses can be masked through site design and development standards, there are certain uses that are incompatible with surrounding uses and should not be permitted.

As required by the State, the **Quality Community Objectives** demonstrate the unique ideals established for each Character Area. (See Section II, subsection 4 of this plan for descriptions of each Quality Community Objective.) While there is certainly a value to regional planning, planning on the neighborhood (or character area) level allows for the greater implementation of specific objectives, which ultimately promotes an improved quality of life.

The *Implementation Measures* are the specific activities or programs which could take place within each of the Character Areas. While the suggested list of measures may or may not currently exist in the Greater Berrien Community, their implementation in appropriate areas would help achieve the established objectives and overall development strategy for each Character Area. In most cases, these measures should be considered joint efforts between the local government, development community, and citizens alike.

Character Area and Existing Land Use maps are provided in the Appendix.


#### CHARACTER AREAS

#### Agriculture

(Unincorporated Berrien County)

#### **DESCRIPTION**

These are prime agriculture areas intended for agricultural use. Residential uses should be accessory to agricultural uses and should maintain a rural character. Residential lots should be large (no less than 1 acre), or else homes should be clustered on smaller lots to preserve large tracts of natural areas and open space. Setbacks, residential landscaping, and site design should be employed to maintain a rural character, with plentiful open space and wooded areas. The land in Berrien County is approximately 95% agricultural, dedicated to farming, including fields, lots, pastures, livestock production, and specialty farms.





#### **PREDOMINANT LAND USES:**

Agricultural farm operations and related activities, natural resource conservation, groundwater recharge areas, and low-density residential development accessory to agricultural or farm operations of varying sizes.

#### **DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY:**

Preserve the rural/agricultural character of these areas by maintaining very low-density residential development primarily accessory to farm operations and large lot sizes. The use of conservation easements to protect environmentally sensitive areas should be encouraged. Roadways in these areas should be widened only when required to meet public safety standards.




